In order to have an influence on the culture and events of our time, we need to act with this environment and atmosphere in our hearts and minds — one of strength, peace, joy, serenity and wisdom. Heaven — with myriads of angels, the cloud of witnesses and, above all, God himself — has a message for us: "You should no longer act on your own, but fall into line with heavenly forces".

The way out of the desert

When we study the exodus of the people of Israel from Egypt, we make some very interesting and informative discoveries. Many unexpected experiences at various times, their judgment and evaluation of these experiences, dissatisfaction with their current situation, and over-

coming of all the challenges of the desert environment repeatedly caused disappointment and frustration among the people of Israel. This resulted in an attitude of grumbling and complaining within their hearts.

A consequence of this continuous attitude of murmuring against God, of contempt for his nature and divine purpose for them, was that almost everyone over the age of 20 had to die in the desert, and the duration of the desert wandering was extended to 40 years. Clearly, this was a serious offense with far-reaching consequences!

As we look back at the history of our nation, we too see a history of grace and God's provision and, of course, of many challenges. And we, too, have largely given in to an attitude of grumbling, complaining, whining, rebellion, negative judgment, and more - both within society and in the church, the body of Jesus.

As followers of Jesus, do we recognise in this attitude a form of contempt for God and lack of belief in his goodness, love, and authority? Do we see in this a denial of the nature and will of God, whose thoughts are only of hope for our future, and for whom we are his messengers and ambassadors?

It's not so much about not accepting the circumstances, but about evaluating, acknowledging and correct understanding of the reality of our God, his nature and his good will for us.

- For us as the body of Jesus: to bring into the light our own attitude of heart and for repentance. (Psalm 139:23+24)
- For a deeper recognition of the nature of God, and his goodness, love and authority. (1 John 4:16)
- Awareness of our being ambassadors of Christ in society.

Legacy of Pope Benedict XVI

The passing of Pope Benedict XVI (Joseph Ratzinger) on the last day of the year marked an event which was worth so much more attention than all other signs and declarations of a significant turning point in 2022. With him went one of the greatest thinkers of our time, a gifted teacher in the church, an inspiring apologist and defender of the philosophical foundations of Europe, of law, justice and human dignity. As a Theology Professor, Cardinal and Pope, he saw himself throughout his life as one to stand firmly for the truth - the truth of God as revealed in Christ for the salvation of mankind. Like no other pope before him, he worked to make the Word of God bear fruit in the church and society. In the uprising of 1968 with students revolting against church and state, his most famous book: "Introduction to Christianity", helped generations of young people to find the truth in the character and person of God.

He reconciled belief in reason and in faith, as they were being presented as opposites in the course of secularisation. He warned against the denial of objective truth and a dictatorship of relativism, which would bring about totalitarianism and the rule of political might over human rights. Freedom comes only with truth, and all that is true, good and beautiful is an expression of participation in the divine. He always encouraged people in a post-Christian world to have a good memory, a clear conscience and a vivid imagination and, as a minority endowed with creative minds, to serve humanity with the best of Europe's heritage. His last words were: "Lord, I love you."

In the first part of his Jesus-book, Ratzinger highlights two events in the life of Jesus with his disciples: the confession of Peter (Mark 8:27-29) and the transfiguration of Jesus (Mark 9:2-8). Let us pray that the theological legacy of Pope Benedict will unfold such as to firmly establish the church as a whole in confessing Jesus as the Christ - God's Anointed One, and that, in the time now to come, an experience of the glory of God will bear witness to the truth of this confession of Christians world-wide, as God proclaimed: "This is my Son, whom I love. Listen to him!" (Mark 9:7).

Standing on the side of the Israeli government

The new Israeli government under Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has been in office since the end of December and is under fire. A visit to the Temple Mount by Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir prompted the UN Security Council to call an emergency meeting in early January, as if world peace were in jeopardy.

In mid-January, Israel's highest court ruled that Netanyahu had to dismiss Interior and Health Minister Arie Deri. The protests in the country are primarily directed against a proposed judicial reform that is intended to limit the court's power to amend or override legislative proposals from the government for changes to the law or for the introduction of new laws.

In December of last year, a study was presented at a conference in the European Parliament, describing the international legal foundations of the State of Israel, why the two-state solution failed, and proposing a path to peace that is consistent

with legal, historical and political realities. In January of this year the study received positive comments in a Frankfurt daily newspaper. However, the article was deleted a few days later and replaced by a "correction" full of misrepresentations, which in turn called for the world to carefully examine the plan for themselves and prompted a Berlin daily newspaper to launch a sweeping attack on right-wing nationalist Christians and the authors.

- Thanks for the new Israeli government; for protection, unity and strength in seeking the wisdom of God. (1 Kings 3:5-12)
- That the discussion about a two-state solution in Germany and Europe gets a new direction which results in the presentation of realistic alternatives. (Ezekiel 39:25-29)
- That criticism and interference in Israel's internal affairs
 will give way to respect for the new government and that
 Germany will stand on the side of the Jewish state.
 (Isaiah 2:1-4)
