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Ukraine - Escalation and the yearning for freedom

Ministry of Economics and Climate Protection

A "green" network of relatives and confidants has recently been uncovered around the Federal Minister of Economics and Climate Protection, Robert Habeck. The connections from the Ministry are to foundations and think-tanks close to the Greens, to business, and to international investors. These prepare studies on behalf of the Ministry, make policy recommendations, and finance climate activists. State Secretary Patrick Graichen, the head of the energy transition policy, had to vacate his post, and a confidant of his was prevented from becoming the new head of the German Energy Agency. Other secretaries of state, lobbyists and company holdings are being checked.

A ministry needs consultants and institutions to establish a good technical foundation for its policies. Compliance rules apply to all of this, which are intended to prevent nepotism and conflicts that lead to interest-based politics. The "green" network was set up before 2020 and came with Habeck to the control centres of the Ministry of Economics and Climate Protection. Uncovering of the network of relationships follows questionable decisions such as the gas levy and the shutdown of the last nuclear power plants despite the energy crisis, and now comes at the same time as the discussion about the new building energy law which is to ban new gas and oil heating systems from 2024. And this means that millions of homeowners, businesses, and administrations will have to spend many times over the previous investments in new heating systems. This is not about some simple mistakes by the Minister, but is about a political agenda that is to be enforced nationally and internationally, over people's heads and without democratic transparency.

Sexual abuse of children in Germany

Child prostitution is usually associated with sex-tourism in Asia. But it also exists in Germany. The victims are not only brought to Germany by human trafficking from Eastern Europe and Africa. There are also many German agents among them. The global commercial sexual exploitation of children is a billion-Dollar business. The United Nations estimates that, every year, around 150 million girls and 73 million boys under the age of 18 are forced to have sex. Human trafficking is taking place everywhere. The boundaries between pure abuse and commercial exploitation are fluid. It is very hard to even imagine the horrific violence that is perpetrated against (small) children and even to babies. But it takes place every day, not only in the "milieu", (where it is known to be commonly practiced), but in all social classes. Many children who fall into prostitution have already been through a martyrdom of sexual violence in their own family environment. Child prostitution often takes place in secret, where nobody suspects it. Some children have a very regulated everyday life and must prostitute themselves between school and their evening meal.

Children are increasingly being sexually exploited by way of the Internet. Sex offenders pay to watch livestream sexual abuse of boys and girls. Ritual violence is an extremely brutal form of abuse. Through severe physical and psychological violence in the context of an ideological/ritual superstructure, the perpetrators will deliberately force "the expression of completely separate personalities" (spinning off from their own natural personality) in the victim. Dissociation (withdrawal from the acknowledgement of what has happened) is the natural reaction to traumatic experiences. To protect against the victim being totally overwhelmed, the horrors are divided between several personalities. In this way, the victims become "controllable" for perpetrators and, in adulthood, they often no longer have any conscious memory of the abusive acts. The experience is so cruel that they are often not believed, which is why criminal charges are rare.

Let us ask the Holy Spirit to pray together with us for the children. (Romans 8:26). In darkness let light come. (Luke 8:17). We call forth experts who summarise the research data and thus ensure better awareness among aid organisations and authorities. And we call the affected children to the father heart of God. Cultivating gratitude

Cultivating gratitude is a key to all of this. It can be exercised like a muscle. Brain scans of test volunteers confirm its neurobiological effects. Practicing a new behaviour once a day for 66 days is enough to make it a habit. Our brain is malleable into old age. Science speaks here about neuroplasticity, while the Bible speaks of our ability to renew our thinking. In cooperation with the work of the Holy Spirit, we as Christians have a clear benefit that we should use more than ever!

Our society needs resilient Christians who can withstand the storms and bring with them solutions for a life of strength and confidence. Society needs us as bearers of hope and bringers of salvation. We can no longer afford to be conformed to the world's way of thinking with its grumbling and complaining, its ingratitude and hopelessness, but we are called to renew our minds (Romans 12:1ff) in order to be salt and light in our society.

Prayer for you personally and the body of Jesus:

- For the transformation of attitudes/thoughts that are common to the world and for willingness and strategies to cultivate a new sense of gratitude, perhaps keeping a diary of your times of being thankful and accountable for building relationships or similar. (Psalm 139:23-24)
- To be a positive and solution-oriented witness and for taking a lead in society. (Matthew 5:13ff)
