The coalition agreement between the CDU and SPD is now in draft form. It does not entail a policy shift, but rather seeks to reassure all sides. The planned relief for businesses from taxes, energy costs, and bureaucracy is now not expected to have the potential to create new economic momentum. The law regarding the heating tax is to be repackaged, but the energy policy of the former SPD/FDP/Green coalition and the European Union will mainly be continued. Measures to curb illegal migration are now subject to legal and feasibility considerations. Urgent reforms to the tax, pension, and social security systems are lacking.

The Cannabis Legalization Act and the Self-Determination Act (self-determination of how law applies) are now being evaluated rather than abolished. Family policy continues along the old lines, where the demographic crisis requires as a short-term measure, young people have the courage to build families and have children.

Germany needs a break from entrenched structures and from ideological commitments. Let us stand in prayer beneath the cross of Jesus for Germany.

Psychological stress from digital media consumption

In a world characterised by digital online networking, the number of welcome and invitation messages, and constant availability to be used, young people in particular are now increasingly under pressure. A worrying trend is emerging here in Germany, and of course in other such countries, where excessive digital media consumption is having a noticeable impact on the mental health of children and adolescents. Between TikTok, Instagram, and constant news streams, many young people are losing touch with themselves and the real world.

Studies show that young people in Germany spend an average of several hours a day with digital media. The time they spend online is steadily increasing, while other activities such as sports, reading, or social interactions are steadily declining. This shift has consequences.

Psychologists and educators are increasingly reporting problems with concentration, inner restlessness, depression, and anxiety among young people. Many young people experience a constant feeling of "not being good enough" because they compare themselves to idealised representations of others. Social media subtly conveys certain ideals with regard to beauty, success, wealth, popularity. These images act as constant invitations to personal evaluations. This can be devastating, especially during puberty, a time of searching for identity and self-awareness. The number of "like" and "acknowledgement" messages become proxies for self-esteem. Those who receive little such resonance and acknowledgement from the system quickly then feel rejected or unimportant. The constant input prevents having time for a true understanding of information and promotes nervousness. Sleep disturbances, increased irritability, and emotional exhaustion are the consequences.

Communication has never been so easy and constantly available – and yet many young people still feel lonely. Online exchanges are no substitute for real relationships. The human need for depth, resonance, understanding, and genuine communication with others often remains unmet.

Prayer:

- We want to assume spiritual fatherhood and motherhood for the precious young generation. (Genesis 17:2f)
- For times without computer screens, times for rituals such as shared meals without cell phones, offline afternoons, or digital detoxification days, so that young people can regain a sense of real life.
- For healthy spiritual development, genuine relationships, open conversations about feelings and stress without judgment, and shared real-life experiences. (John 10:10f)

Demonstrations in Gaza - a call for prayer

At the end of March, reports of demonstrations in the Gaza Strip increased. Thousands of people took to the streets in

several locations over many days to demonstrate against Hamas rule, and to demand an end to the war and the release of the Israeli hostages.

In mid-April, after Hamas again rejected a ceasefire proposal from Israel, one of the largest protest actions took place, which was attended by people of all ages. These people dared, publicly and in front of the world, to name Hamas, not Israel, as the source of their suffering and to distance themselves from Hamas. They no longer want to act as human shields, to sacrifice their children, and to live under Hamas's brutal and intimidating rule. The price they are willing to pay for this is very high, as Hamas is responding, as in the past, with arrests, abuse, torture, and even murder.

The number of those willing to join these protests is growing. Whether, in the light of Hamas's repression, a critical mass will emerge that can overthrow this demonic rule from within is uncertain. Consistent and decisive intervention on the part of the international community against this terrorist regime is rather unlikely. From a human perspective, this entire situation seems almost unsolvable.

Middle East journalist Paul Calvert from Bethlehem sees a spiritual revival as the only solution to the war in Gaza, as this war is not primarily a fight against flesh and blood, but against the rule of evil, which brings destruction, suffering, and death. (Ephesians 6:12). Yet amidst the destruction, Jesus is meeting the people of Gaza and the entire Middle East in dreams and visions and leading them to true freedom. He is and remains the Prince of Peace and the one who has all authority in heaven and on earth! (Isaiah 9:6-7).

Prayer:

- For spiritual revival in Gaza and among the Palestinians in general. God wants to meet these people in their distress and lead them to freedom. Let us recognise and declare that these protests are a sign of the beginning of a spiritual break-through in the Gaza Strip. (Isaiah 43:19; Matthew 7:7f)
- For supernatural encounters with Jesus resulting in true repentance and conversion among members of Hamas. (1 Timothy 2:3ff, Psalm 145:8)
- For the release of the hostages and for the healing of their unimaginably maltreated bodies and souls in the tunnels. (Psalm 23; Hebrews 13:3; Psalm 126)
